Down From The Summit?

History News has tried to keep abreast of the results of the History Summit called by Federal Education Minister Bishop in August 2006. Much has been written and discussed since and certainly history, especially Australian history, has received more official backing than it has enjoyed for about 20 years. But what has happened?

Has there been any more recognition of the role that historical societies can play in the development of curricula at middle secondary school level? Has there been much encouragement for teachers to revitalise curricula that use local cultural environments as well as national and global frameworks? Are school students and future Australian voters being exposed to the questions in our national history that require searching for answers?

The high hopes post-Summit were that some of this might be achieved but the latest news seems to be that the careful and valuable 'open-ended' questions devised by a panel of experts did not meet the political expectations behind the Summit and that a further panel, even more removed from the realities of secondary classrooms than the previous panels, should provide further advice! At this point we could despair about the shabby ways in which those who really know continue to be treated but we need to keep fighting to make a difference in schools as many historical societies are already doing at the grassroots.

RHSV receives further funding to work with multicultural groups

RALPH SUTTON (1921-2007)

The Society was grieved to learn of the recent death of Ralph Sutton. Ralph, born in Bathurst NSW, served in both the Second World War and Korean conflicts; enlisting in the former in 1943 and discharged in 1947 as a Lieutenant 1 Parachute Battalion and serving in the latter as Major in the 3rd Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment. References to his exploits and the attitudes to his comrades in the Korean campaign are recorded in Korea Remembered.

Ralph had an undoubted interest in history both as a discipline and a practice. As an author, co-author and editor he contributed to our understanding of military history with various works; for example: A Military Research Guide for Family Historians (Royal Australian Historical Society, nd), For Queen and Empire: a Boer War chronicle (1974); A Military bibliography for family historians: British units in Australasia (1988); Through war to peace (1996), Military forces in New South Wales: an introduction. Part 1, 1788-1904 (2000).


Ralph was an enthusiastic volunteer in our Collections and Research area. His advice on matters military, research in general and on editorial issues was respected and greatly appreciated. Even in the last weeks of his life he was still contributing to the editing of indexes for the Images Collection. It was at Ralph's instigation that the Society celebrated Victoria's links to royalty when he donated to the RHSV his collection of memorabilia gathered as a consequence of his major role in the conduct of the first visit to Australia of Elizabeth II in 1954. Curator. Daisy Searls, used this as a stimulus for an exhibition in 2004 focussing on royal visits to Victoria since the first in 1867.

In 2006 Ralph prepared an obituary for a colleague from the Korean Campaign. In part it said that this officer was a role model, loyal, intelligent, experienced and would be sadly missed by family, friends and those who worked with him. How much this describes Ralph's contribution to our Society.

Heather Barry Ronald – Died 1 July 2007

It was with great sadness that the RHSV learned of the death of Heather Barry Ronald. Heather Ronald was the author of many history books including Hounds are Running (1970), Wool Past the Winning Post (1978), The Home Horse Doctor (1980), Aldworth (1983), Home Management (1984), Wool Before the Wind (1987), and Farewell my Heart (1997).

Wool Past the Winning Post and Wool Before the Wind both received the Alexander Henderson Award for best family history and Farewell my Heart received a special certificate of merit.

History Begins At Home

History Begins at Home, the current exhibition at the RHSV, began as a practical exercise - to see how our collection supported the VCE History Curriculum Applied History in the Community.

The outcome is an outstanding exhibition revealing the strengths and treasures within our collection - particularly our glass plate slides - that document the history of our neighbourhood.

Examples of material on display includes:

Photographs taken by John Noone from the tower of Rostella - Dr. Fitzgerald's house on the north side of Lonsdale Street between William and Queens Streets. The nominal date for the photographs is December 1869 - giving a detailed and valuable record of how the western part of central Melbourne looked at the time.

A photograph of the first Exhibition Building - a timber and iron construction in William Street - taken in 1854. This is now the site of the Royal Mint.

Photographs and drawings of the first Government Offices built in 1846.

The exhibition resounds with maps, ephemera and drawings from our collection - do please come and enjoy it.

Printers of the Streets and Lanes of Melbourne

A fascinating talk linking Melbourne's printers with the history of printing since Gutenberg in the thirteenth century and the technology of the day, the arrival of printing in Australia and Victoria in general and how the printers started up in Melbourne in particular.

Melbourne's printing industry began less than two years after foundation of Port Phillip when co-founder John Pascoe Fawkner published his newspaper "Melbourne Advertiser" first handwritten in January 1838. Since then, early printers and publishers were attracted to Port Phillip and following the goldrush the Macdougalls, Theodore Troedel and a host of small and large privately owned printeries and the Government Printing Office began in central Melbourne. Many thousands of compositors, printers, bookbinders, ink and papermakers arrived for guaranteed employment opportunities. Many first came to dig for gold but returned disappointed to their trades in the city and the growing provincial towns.

Don Hauser left school in 1952 at age fourteen following the death of father and entered a six year apprenticeship as a compositor. Technical training with Exchange Press, RMIT and Melbourne College of Printing and Graphic Arts achieved distinctions including outstanding apprentice awards and a Victorian Overseas Foundation travelling scholarship for two and a half years in USA and United Kingdom.

Don is an award winning printer, having won the International Benjamin Franklin Award for a book for BHP in 1988 and several Australian National Print Award Gold Medals for excellence in print.

Retired from business in 2005 age 68. Wrote, designed, typeset and self-published first book in 2006

Botanical Riches tells stories of botanical exploration, worldwide, from the dawn of time to the present. Presented by Richard Aitken, one of the State Library of Victoria's Creative Fellows, Botanical Riches showcases treasures held in the Library's rare printed collections.

The botanical riches of this lecture are twofold. The plants themselves provide riches almost without limit, spanning an astonishing physical, social, and cultural spectrum. From utility to ornament, their almost inexhaustible patrimony has clothed, fed, warmed, protected, and inspired humans since the dawn of time. The collective library of books documenting the exploration and appreciation of plants forms the second of the botanical riches. Like the plants they depict, this resource is an extensive one, and one that is richly evocative of cultural and social history. In many cultures the written word and graven image is inextricably linked to plants and plant products, so there seems a pleasing conjunction here between plants and their images. From papyrus scrolls of ancient Egypt, palm-leaf books of Asia, to the finest quality rag paper made of flax, is a record that is often inspirational and of great and sometimes, unintentional beauty.

Richard Aitken is an architect and garden historian currently researching Australian garden styles for The University of Melbourne's Faculty of Architecture, Building and Planning. He has prepared conservations plans for some of Australia's most culturally significant gardens, including the botanic gardens of Melbourne, Sydney and Adelaide. He edited The Oxford Companion to Australian Gardens (2002) and has published widely on the history and poetics of gardens and other designed landscapes. His recent books include Gardenesque: a celebration of Australian gardening (2004), Botanical Riches: stories of botanical exploration (2006), and Seeds of Change: an illustrated history of Adelaide Botanic Garden (2006).

Will Dyson was remarkably talented, humorous and versatile. He was internationally acclaimed in several spheres: as a brilliant and powerful cartoonist, as Australia's first and finest official



war artist, and as an outstanding etcher. An admirer described him in his heyday as the most famous Australian in the world.

Dyson was also a sublime writer and an instinctive radical with dazzling wit and a convivial personality. He married Ruby Lindsay, and knew all her celebrated brothers well—Norman, Lionel, Daryl and Percy Lindsay.

Ross McMullin, an award winning biographer, is an entertaining and experienced speaker who has given Will Dyson talks at the Melbourne Writers Festival, the Norman Lindsay Gallery and numerous other venues. His illustrated Dyson presentation is amusing, illuminating and poignant.

Will Dyson: Australia's Radical Genius was highly commended by the judges of the 2007 National Biography Award. Ross McMullin's previous books include the military biography Pompey Elliott (which won two awards) and the ALP centenary history The Light on the Hill.

Within the list is 'McCubbin, Frederick (Pending L.)


L. indicates 'License to Teach'. Perhaps he was a border-line case!

Victorian Community History Awards 2007

This year the Victorian Community History Awards made a welcome return. The awards are sponsored by Information Victoria and judged by the Royal Historical Society of Victoria. The awards are divided into 7 categories and are to recognize the importance of local and community history as a form of collective memory and to recognize excellence in historical research. 10th Annual Victorian Museum Awards

The winners of the 2007 Victorian Museum of the Year Awards were announced in June.

Winner- Staff of seven or more: State Library of Victoria Travelling Treasures Program

Demonstrating a high level of engagement - raising the profile of local history and the local library - the State Library of Victoria's *Travelling Treasures* program tours collection items held by the library across the state. Including items such as Ned Kelly's Jerilderie letter, the program provides rare and intimate access to some of the Library's most extraordinary books, documents and artifacts.

Winner - Staff of one to six persons: Melbourne's Living Museum of the West

The idea behind the Melbourne Living Museum of the West "Pobblebonk" Exhibition originated from a request by the EPA to respond to an act of river pollution. Promoting the idea that communities are responsible for their own environment, the exhibition documented the unique flora and fauna of the Maribynong River estuary and actively engaged the various communities in the Maribynong area.

Winner – Wholly volunteer run: Yackandandah District Historical Society Fire Recovery Program

On 21 December 2006 a devastating fire completely destroyed the front building of the Yackandandah and District Historical Society. In the six months since, a very dedicated group of volunteers have worked very hard to retrieve, clean and reorganize the recovery and refurbishment of the building including a state wide fundraising effort.

OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS

Winner - Outstanding Achievement Award (Paid): Bruce Baxter, Pioneer Settlement Museum

Recognised for going well beyond the call of duty in everything he does, Bruce Baxter has been teaching Aboriginal culture for the pat 40 years. His commitment to teaching Koori culture has seen Bruce's program become a highlight for visitors and school communities alike.

Winner - Outstanding Acheivement Award (Volunteer) Peter John Adler, Murtoa and District Historical Society and Community Museum

Peter John Adler has passionately and tirelessly enriched the lives of the young and old who have walked through the doors of the Murtoa and District Historical Society and Community Museum over the last 22 years. The dedicated taxidermist constantly builds on his vast knowledge of local history so that he can share it with visitors and volunteers alike.

Museums Australia Victoria manages these awards. Museums Australia Victoria or MA (Vic.) provides professional services for members to develop and sustain the role and interests of museum communities across Victoria. MA (Vic)'s mission is to build an environment in which Victorian museums, museum personnel and museum-based activities flourish and develop.

The Victorian Museum Awards recognize all areas of museum practice. It is encouraging that many historical societies entered the awards and a great opportunity for the diversity of activity within historical societies to be recognised.

Professional Pathways in History

RHSV members will be aware of people who work in the field of history, but may wish to know more about the role of 'professional historians' and their various areas of work. The Professional Historians Association of Victoria (PHA Vic) is pleased to accept the offer from RHSV Executive Officer, Kate Prinsley, to outline what a professional historian is and to explain the role of the PHA.

There are several types of historians – academic historians, history teachers, local historians, history enthusiasts and professional historians. Universityemployed academic historians write for their peers in books, journals and conference papers, and undertake specialised theoretical research, along with teaching duties. History enthusiasts possess detailed knowledge on their local area or specific subject, contribute valuable research material to community collections and write books and articles on topics specific to their interests. In many respects, professional historians bring together these various strands of history work to produce histories in a range of different formats that are accessible to both particular and general audiences.

Although each type of historian has a different role in the community, we all have one thing in common – a passion for history. This passion is expressed in the time, patience and commitment it takes to research and write history. A passion for history motivates the dedicated local historical society member to spend many hours indexing the local newspaper or identifying photographs. The same passion for history leads students into post-graduate study and careers as historians, whether in academia or as freelance professionals.

The contributions to our collective heritage made by all types of historians should be acknowledged. Indeed opportunities to work together can produce rewarding outcomes that benefit everyone. Professional historians employed to undertake a history of a particular place, group or activity, appreciate the knowledge and work contributed by local history enthusiasts and value well-

supported local collections. Because most professional historians work to strict deadlines and budgets, it is important that we have the skills to grasp new concepts quickly, digest large bodies of information and produce work that is accessible to the general reader and meets the specific needs of our clients.

Professional historians work in a range of fields including heritage, tourism, education, local government, archives, museums, collection management and community engagement. We perform an array of tasks, from researching a broad range of subjects using a myriad of research tools and sources, to curating exhibitions and conducting oral histories, heritage studies, and significance assessments of historical collections.

Professional historians also research and write commissioned, thematic and environmental histories and provide advice to government and quasi-government bodies.

Writing in a variety of styles, professional historians use different mediums, from a 200 word website entry or a guided walk pamphlet, to a lengthy publication marking the history of an organisation, region or individual. Because of the variety of our work, we are able to build up a diverse body of knowledge, which we can bring to each new project. Projects can range from small-budget jobs lasting just a few weeks to contracts spanning a year or more.

Professional historians are accredited by the Australian Council of Professional Historians Associations (ACPHA), which sets national accreditation standards based on at least four years full time study for a degree majoring in history. Most members also have a postgraduate degree. Professional historians

are thus trained to research, analyse and document our findings. We use these skills for primary and secondary research, oral history interviews, writing and manuscript preparation, referencing, sourcing images and obtaining permission to reproduce material. Historians often work with other professionals for transcribing, indexing and editing services, and also liaise with designers, printers and publishers to produce an outcome that meets the requirements and budget of the client.

The Professional Historians Association (Vic) is the peak body that represents over one hundred accredited professional historians throughout the state. The PHA supports its members with ongoing professional development, including a regular newsletter, and promotes high professional standards amongst members. It also promotes the work of professional historians in the wider community and assists potential employers in hiring professional historians for specific projects. Each state in Australia has its own PHA.

The national body, ACPHA, has developed a *Scale of Fees Recommended for the Engagement of Professional Historians in Australia*, and a model contract to assist professional historians in contract negotiations and in maintaining good working relationships with their clients. ACPHA is also responsible for the accreditation standards and code of ethics.

Cass Alexander (ed.), Rushworth & District 1853-2006, Rushworth & District Historical & Preservation Society Inc.,




PO Box 102, Rushworth, 3612, 2006, pp. 92, \$20 posted. This attractive little book succeeds an earlier version published in 1998. The contrast is considerable. There is some additional written material and new photographs especially of the last few years but there has also been a major enhancement of the photographs that formed the substance of the first edition by the use of more suitable paper and new image and reproduction technologies. The images are ones to treasure and they clearly show how a local collection can be used not only to convey the region's history but also the resources of its historical society.

Ian Black, *History of Hamilton Rotary Club 1937–2007*, Rotary Club of Hamilton, 2007, pp. 120. A comprehensive assemblage that documents the membership, activities, community involvement of an institution that's widely spread in Australian localities. Chronologically arranged, with biographical details of founders, presidents and others, and with lists of members, this book can be a rich source for family and local historians, as well as of interest to those with close connections to Hamilton Rotary.

Geoffrey Blainey, A History of Victoria,

Cambridge University Press, Melbourne, 2006, pp. ix + 304. ISBN10 0 52186 977 5. The first version of this book appeared as Our Side of the Country and was published in 1984 at the time of Victoria's 150 years of European settlement. The new edition has three additional



chapters dealing with recent politics, change in Melbourne, and change in rural and regional Victoria; a short chronology; and some rearrangements of the earlier chapters. This is not one of the author's path-breaking books but it has Blainey's hallmarks of excellent writing and accessibility.

Bill Murray and Roy Hay (eds), *The World Game Downunder*, ASSH Studies 19, Australian Society for Sports, Melbourne, 2006, pp. v + 187. ISBN 0 9757616 6 8. The popularity of soccer as a football code in Australia is well-known as are the sometimes ugly images and the failures of management that have often marred its reputation. This collection of essays, put together by academic historians with strong links to the game, engages with the difficulties, successes and hopes for the sport; it explores aspects of its past especially its international links; and it documents much of its recent history as well as its historiography.

John Ramsland and Christopher Mooney, Remembering Aboriginal Heroes, Struggle, Identity and the Media,

Brolga, Melbourne, 2006, pp. xvii + 374. ISBN 1-920785-85-X. The book comprises a series of biographies of Aboriginal Australians who became media celebrities in the 1940s and 1950s – Albert Namatjira, Harold Blair,

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Dave Sands, Ngarla Kunoth and Robert Tudawali, Reg Saunders, Doug Nicholls, Harry Penrith and Jimmy Little, and there are also substantial pieces about David Unaipon and Douglas Grant from earlier times. The book concentrates on the media presentation of these figures in the daily newspapers and weekly magazines during the period when assimilation policies were adopted by governments. That some of them like Blair and Sands are scarcely recognized now is also pondered. It is well documented and illustrated but there is no index and sometimes they have missed a reference in the conventional sources that would have helped their analysis, eg. their account of the relationship between Harold Blair and John Lloyd in Melbourne would have benefited from reading the *ADB* entries for the Lloyds in volume 15.

Ralph P. Neale, *Racers of the Deep, The Yankee Clippers and Bluenose Clippers on the Australian Run 1852–1869*, Australian Scholarly, Melbourne, 2007, pp.xvi + 396,

\$44. ISBN 174097 115 9. There is an understandable fascination with the 19th century ships that brought many immigrants to the Australian colonies. This well-researched and elegantly produced book focuses on the



ships of the Black Ball and White Star lines that dominated the Liverpool-Australasian colonies run in the 1850s and 1860s. The ships were mostly built in the USA but British owned. The ships, their owners and captains provide the narrative that also does much to detail the experience of travel on the Australian run in the period. The author is a long-term member of the RHSV.
