The RHSV has received a grant from Victorian Multicultural Commission to develop and produce its exhibition for History Week



In 2005 the RHSV held a fabulous exhibition, 'History Community Identity: Showcasing Melbourne's Diversity'. I was the lucky curator, bringing together the stories and photographs of Victorians from Vietnamese, Sudanese, Kurdish, Arabic, Polish, Hungarian, Maltese and Estonian backgrounds.

As well as individual banners representing each group, the RHSV was able produce a beautiful booklet which was so popular that copies are now rare as hens' teeth. The booklet was able to bring greater detail to the stories as well as an overall picture of what has happened to the communities since their arrival in Victoria.

In 2008 I am continuing the exploration of the diversity of our state meeting with Latin Americans from Chile, Paraguay, Uruguay, Salvador, Argentina, Mexico, Cuba, Colombia, Nicaragua, Guatemala, Brazil, Bolivia and other Central and South American countries.

Most people left these countries to escape revolution, civil war and the aftermath of these upheavals. The largest group in Melbourne are from Chile and arrived as refugees or skilled migrants. After some years they brought their parents out. This pattern is very different to the European and Middle Eastern migrations to Australia where people leaving war torn countries had often already lost their parents or were forced to escape with limited possibility of bringing out other family members.

The Latin American groups are also different to others living in Melbourne because they are united by language. All but Brazilians are Spanish speakers. Brazilians speak Portuguese.

Perhaps more surprising is the number of people I have spoken to whose parents were themselves migrants from Europe to South America after the Second World War. Several of the Argentines I have spoken to are the children of Italians.

The numbers of these migrants in Melbourne are relatively small and tend therefore to club together to socialise, play sport, hold festivals and CELAS, the Spanish American Welfare Centre, located in Footscray, East Melbourne and Springvale, looks after the physical, social and psychological needs of all the communities, including the older Spanish community.

Most older family members speak little or no English, having followed their children to Australia well into middle age.

Despite difficulties, most Spanish Americans have taken to their life in Melbourne with great enthusiasm. They have easily continued their own cultural traditions while enjoying the multifaceted life that contemporary Melbourne offers bringing their own music, dance and customs to the scene.

The great challenge for me as a researcher in such a project is to distinguish the experiences of individuals and communities in the detail of the brief which is to look at the way background has affected the lives lived since arrival

I am just at the beginning of the project and will present a proper report to the Society when I have completed the project. As always the best part of such a project is meeting people and trying to understand how they live.

POSITION VACANT




Next HVSG Seminar Day at Kyneton 6 September

Melbourne was gazetted in 1837, with a market reservation allocated on the south-eastern side of the Collins and William Street intersection. However, no action had been taken to open it by 1840. The Port Philip Patriot reported that existing food merchants sold poor meat at exorbitant prices and suggested markets would encourage higher standards through competition. Soon, Melbourne hosted numerous markets.

This exhibition traces how Melbourne's markets moved, often being condemned as too small, subject to the whims of a growing and changing city, and, as markets have for centuries, facilitated economic, social and political exchange.



Dig 3ft NW: the legendary journey of Burke & Wills


Sarah Murgatrovd Text, Melbourne, 2008, pp. xi + 228, \$22.95




aptain Cool

a lone bush prospector in the Fryer's Forest near Castlemaine: his upbringing and schooling; his court appearances and prison periods; his relationships with the police; but overall, his survival in the bush on the margins of society for over 50 years. He died in 1953. The authors have skilfully used the official records, newspapers, and oral testimony to give an interesting account of an eccentric individual.

The Melbourne Tram Book

RandallWilson and Dale Budd University of New SouthWales Press, Sydney, 2008, 2nd edition, pp. 80 This is a splendidly illustrated tribute to



Melbourne's trams and tramways, backed by excellent maps, notes and captions, sometimes with a quirky flavour. It packs a lot of authoritative material into its pages and has much to offer both the Melbourne historian and the tram buff.

J.A. Lyons – the tame Tasmanian: appeasement and disarmament in Australia, 1932-39

David Bird Australian Scholarly Publishing, Melbourne, 2008, pp. xii + 431, \$44


Originally a doctoral thesis, this substantial book puts a more positive view of Lyons's foreign and defence

policies in the 1930s than has been current in Australian history writing. His quest for peace was influential in the Munich conference but at the same time he strongly supported the need for rearmament. A revisionist view, strongly argued, in an area of considerable interest but comparative neglect.

ABORIGINES

The Aborigines of Victoria and Riverina

Peter Beveridge Lowden Publishing, 29 Lisbeth Ave., Donvale, 3111, 2008, 1st published 1889, pp. xxxiv + 221, \$45 (+ \$6 p&p)



in 1845 and remained on several properties along the Murray for over 20 years. Peter Beveridge was proficient in several Aboriginal dialects and a keen observer and collector of Aboriginal culture and society in his area. He died in 1885 and his manuscript was published posthumously. He was a correspondent of Brough Smyth, Curr, Howitt, and von Mueller. Attractively produced, this republication makes accessible an otherwise very rare account of Victorian contact history.

Footprints: the journey of Lucy and Percy Pepper

Simon Flagg and Sebastian Gurciello National Archives of Australia and Public Record Office Victoria, Melbourne, 2008, pp. xii+ 132, \$10.

Constructed on the premise that 'archival records can help Aboriginal people

connect with their histories', this book provides practical illustration of how the story of the Peppers, one Gippsland Aboriginal family, can be revealed using the archives and the family's own memories and photographs. Elegantly produced, easily followed, authoritative, and an interesting and analytical story in itself, this little book provides many insights to early 20th century Aboriginal experience in Victoria. At the same time it is a valuable model for guides to archives.

Land of vision and mirage: Western Australia since 1826

Geoffrey Bolton University of Western Australia Press, Perth, 2008, pp. xvi + 270

Bolton's many important works in Australian history over a long professional life are all characterised by good, accessible writing. This latest



fairly short history of his home state is no exception. It is a valuable addition to the state's history that has already been well served by Crowley, Stannage and Bolton himself.

Aborigines & activism: race, Aborigines & the coming of the Sixties to Australia

Jennifer ClarkUniversity of Western Australia Press, Perth, 2008, pp. vii + 308, \$35.95


Australian history has often been written in parochial terms without much discussion of international



contexts. In this book, the author links well-known examples of Aboriginal activism in the 1960s like the 1965 Freedom Ride and the 1967 Referendum, along with later events like the establishment of the Tent Embassy in Canberra, to the anti-war protests, women's movements and civil rights activism in the United States and anti-apartheid struggles in South Africa. As the title suggests, there is also an argument about the meaning of the 'Sixties' with which historians and commentators have been struggling.

'The Argus', life & death of a newspaper Jim Usher (ed.)
