Report from the 99th Annual General Meeting

The meeting opened with Professor Bill Russell welcoming around 40 members.

As this was to be his last AGM as President, Professor Russell commented on how robust the Society seemed with frequently full houses at Speakers Meetings, a conference that had had a waiting list, continuous calls on our collections and research and the increasing viability and visibility of the History Victoria Support Group. He reflected that the Society had begun with a clear vision of its purpose 100 years ago and concluded that "long may its vision remain clear."

The Treasurer gave a short report principally to draw attention to an end of year surplus of almost \$26,000 which was achieved through careful budgeting, earned income, grant income and donations.

This year saw the retirement of 6 Councillors

JUDITH BILSZTA:

Judith has brought wise advice to the Council both in terms of her extensive knowledge of local historical societies throughout the State; her experience as a past president of Melton Historical Society and her expert knowledge of the library collection at the RHSV. She has brought an understanding of the needs of researchers, use of collections and the ability of volunteers to support that. Her involvement with the RHSV for over 30 years is greatly valued and although she is stepping down from Council she will continue her voluntary role as research officer with the Society

SUSAN PREISTLEY

Susan has served as President from 1998 -2002 and has become the unofficial "corporate historian" - her outstanding paper at our recent conference underlines this. In her role as President she was largely responsible for bringing us to this building. Latterly Susan has served as the chair of the Public Programs/ Outreach Committee - organizing with the support of the committee, our annual speakers program which excels in its diversity and breadth of Victorian history, and the wonderful excursions and long trips. These are a form of cultural tourism, beautifully researched, organized and thoroughly enjoyed by all who attend. The book sale is another of Susan's quiet achievements which we hope she will continue to do.

RICHARD BARNDEN

Richard has served on Council for six years. His insightful advice in overview of budgets and operational aspects of the Society has been invaluable. Richard has practical experience in most aspects of the Society, particularly in his excellent management of the images collection and more recently he has supported the librarians in cataloguing the collections. He has served on the Collections Committee. Richard has made a great contribution to Council. Although he is stepping down, he will remain a key figure in the running of the Society.

PETER YULE

Peter has served as Vice President for six years. He has ably supported the work of Council particularly in the chairing of meetings and establishment of the Foundation. Peter has served on the Executive, the Publications and the Foundation Committee – he will maintain his involvement with the Society, particularly with Publications Committee and the Foundation.

WESTON BATE

It is impossible to sum up everything that Weston has brought to the RHSV. His insurmountable energy, creative mind and generosity of spirit and time has helped shape the culture and image of the RHSV. He thinks widely looking for extensions and connections for the RHSV and once an idea has been generated - it is always followed through. Weston has served as President and most recently he has been the driving force behind History Week – and establishing the Foundation.

Weston may be retiring from Council but he will maintain his close association with the RHSV

NEW GRANTS

The Helen Macpherson Smith Trust has resolved to establish a special \$2 million HMS Bushfires Grants Fund which will make a significant direct contribution towards assisting the restoration of community life in the rural townships damaged or destroyed by the February 2009 bushfires across Victoria. The Trust holds the view that philanthropy's role in the aftermath of the bushfires lies in the medium to long-term segments of the recovery efforts, and should be related to rebuilding community lifestyles and spirit. Grants from this special Fund will be made to local and state-wide charitable organisations specifically in support of capacity-rebuilding projects and programs to restore the community life of the damaged Victorian townships.

Grants will be considered which: support social, education or health programs which were in existence prior to the fires, but have not been reinstated due to a lack of community capacity; support for the development of new programs to help rebuild the lifestyle of ravaged communities; contributions towards equipment, furniture and fittings, and other facilities damaged and/or lost due to the fires, such as aged care and disability care, education or health; and capacity-building programs to assist community organisations to meet emerging community needs arising from the bushfire tragedy.

Applications from Victorian charitable institutions, public benevolent institutions or health promotion charities can be made to the HMS Bushfires Grants Fund. Grant rounds close at the end of September 2009, January 2010 and April 2010.

Introducing new President and Vice President

Dr Andrew Lemon (President)

Dr Andrew Lemon is an independent professional historian and author of many books, particularly on aspects of Victoria and the history of racing. He edited the *Victorian Historical Journal* from 1990 to 1999 and is a fellow of the RHSV.

Lenore Frost (Vice President)

Lenore has been a member of the History Victoria Support Group since its inception in 2004, and now takes on the role of Convenor of that group. She has had a long-term involvement with Essendon Historical Society, having been a committee member since 1995, Museum Manager since 1995, newsletter editor since 1998, and serving a three year term as President from 2005 to 2008. Lenore has published a number of books on local and family history topics, of which the best known is Dating family photos, 1850 to 1920. She has also acted as editor of several books for the Essendon Historical Society.

Lenore has created a number of indexes, including the index of the Victorian Year Book 1977, Australian Women's Work Exhibition Catalogue 1907, and participated in the indexing of the Women's Petition 1891. Her research interests include a study of the goldrush era settlement on the Keilor Plains, the Essendon/Flemington volunteers in the GreatWar, and the Melbourne Tailoresses' Strike of 1881-82.

Because of the interest in art deco generally and especially the wonderful experiences that were had by all during the Art Deco 2008 Regional Festival jointly presented by the RHSV and Museums Australia (Victoria), and at the National Gallery of Victoria's spectacular art deco exhibition, no-one wants to stop celebrating and rediscovering the style, delights and wonders of the art deco era.


With the aid of a RETI (Regional Exhibition Touring Incentive) grant the Royal Historical Society of Victoria has again been able to engage the services of Janice Haynes who was the Coordinator of the Art Deco 2008 Regional Festival as the Project Manager to develop and plan the Art Deco: Made in Victoria exhibition.

The first request is to identify what items could be loaned to the exhibition. Information will be sent to all historical societies, galleries and museums across Victoria. Items must have been manufactured in Victoria during the period from 1914 – 1945, and must be able to be loaned for entire year 2010. Initial submissions need to be returned by Friday 26th June.

The Future of the RHSV

In its Centenary Year, the RHSV can be proud of its many achievements, but it must also look to the future.

These achievements are many. It has played a central role in the preservation of the records of Victorian history - both through its own collection as an advocate for the preservation of Victoria's public records and the creation and work of the Public Record Office. RHSV has always been a staunch advocate and generous coworker with government in this task.

RHSV has always sought to work strongly with independent local societies. Its first local branch was established as early as 1911; today we can be proud of the History Victoria Support Group, which has provided advice, assistance and seminars across the state, warmly supported by local societies.

The record of the Society in publishing the highest quality research into Victorian history through the annals of the *Victorian Historical Journal*, is a stunning achievement. So too has been its influence on the use of original historical sources in the writing of Victorian history, pioneered by Professor Ernest Scott.

And we can be justly proud of the continuous sequence of lectures, discussions and exhibitions mounted by the Society over the years – from the Historical Exhibitions of the 1930s through to state wide exhibitions such as those recently held for the centenary of the railways or the regional Art Deco Program.

The future of the Society can be firmly built on these achievements, but I would like to identify five ongoing challenges.

First, there is the challenge of maintaining membership and relevance in an age when people have endless choice of leisure, entertainment, intellectual and scholarly activities. In 1910, few organisations occupied the terrain chosen by the Historical Society of Victoria. Today those interested in ideas, and in history, have many offerings to choose from. RHSV must both "stick to the knitting" by celebrating and building on its strengths –but it must also reach out to the many other groups that form its milieu. Sometimes this should involve joint lectures, excursions and publications, and sometimes new venues, drawing the attention of wider groups in Society to the many joys we offer.

Second, there is the opportunity new technology and particularly digitization is providing. Digitizing is allowing images and documents once secluded deep in collections to be made available globally and instantly to new audiences. As the digitization of the image collection at RHSV proceeds, both a source of revenue and a source of outreach is being created. Best of all, the quality of historical research at all levels must be enhanced and accessing of documents

and images becomes easier.

Third, there is sustainability. Its essence lies in the vibrancy of the people of whom the Society is composed, and the vitality of the historical dialogue and discussion they create. But financial sustainability underpins this. Recently, the RHSV has created a Foundation where contributions can build to a mighty fund to guarantee the future of the collection. But another element of sustainability is that the collection must continue to grow and reflect the history of later generations, new forms of Victorian endeavor, and a cultural and linguistic diversity yet to fully enter our discussions.

Fourthly, the Society should develop its relationships with history teaching in schools and universities. There has always been such a link – but there is much more to be done. We should expect that any university student studying Australian history would join our Society; we should expect and cater for school visits to our exhibitions, and we (Summary of Talk given by RHSV President Prof Bill Russell at the RHSV Centenary Conference 1 May 2009. should regard school libraries as natural subscribers to our Journal.

Fifthly, there is the question of a long term home for the Society. This is no simple matter, for we do not want our resources and effort diverted into the duties of building manager or landlord. Perhaps not tomorrow, but at some point, the provision of a permanent home should take prominence as a goal. Such a place should be well endowed by government, philanthropic and community support, and provide a place where the Society's work and collections can be adequately showcased to our communities of interest, to school children and researchers, and to tourists and visitors.

> All of these hopes and possibilities rest in the strength of the members, volunteers, staff, Councillors and affiliates that make up the Society, and their ability and desire to continue the founders

Vision. For a century, this desire has not diminished, and I hope and expect that it will not diminish in the next century either.

Jan Lampard (compiler), 2008 pp. 60.


Very much a souvenir commemorating 150 years, this little booklet comprises a series of short pieces written by locals



about Edenhope institutions and events. It also reprints the booklet produced for the Edenhope centenary. The hope of the compiler is that there will be a more detailed history eventually.

Street Names of Colac

Ida and Andrew McIntosh (eds), Colac and District Historical Society, PO Box 154, Colac, 3250, 2008, pp. 59, \$10 + \$3 postage.



An attractive booklet with material accumulated since the 1970s originally as local history projects in primary schools. The publication provides a useful model for similar ventures, as do the projects from which much of it emanated.

A Living Museum, A Short History of the **Toora Pear Orchard**

Margaret Cole, 2009, pp. 30

The compiler was very much involved in the establishment of the

Toora Pear Orchard in 1996 - a living museum indeed with more than 60 varieties. It serves as both reference point for horticulturists and garden historians.

Fly Like A Falcon, History of The Knox School, The School on Top of the Hill, Burwood Highway, Wantirna South

Glen Turnbull, 2003, pp. 183

Few schools have published histories after 20 years of existence. Perhaps inevitably, this history mostly comprises a chronicle of people and events from 1983. There is a first chapter detailing some of Wantirna's history and especially of the land on which the school is built. The present site was once an extension of Bialik College in Hawthorn. It was sold to Taylors Schools Limited in 1980 and developed by them as Knoxfield College in 1983, later The Knox

School. Those with an interest in the last 20 years will find rich pickings without much sense of the enormous impact of government funding on private schools like Knox.

Australia Through Women's Eyes

Ann Standish

Australian Scholarly Publishing and State Library of Victoria, 2008, pp. viii + 335 A discussion of the writings of women about

Australia taken from the period 1840 to 1930 drawing on some familiar figures and others not as well-known - Katherine Kirkland, Elizabeth Fenton, Louisa Meredith, Annie Baxter Dawbin, Louisa Atkinson, Marianne North, Ellen Clacy, Elizabeth Ramsay-Laye, Clara Aspinall, Fanny Rains, Mrs Charles Thomson, Millicent Stafford, Jessie Ackermann, Beatrice Webb, Katie Langloh Parker and Daisy Bates. The writings examined are mostly travel narratives of the 19th and early 20th century that have usually been seen as marginal in mainstream Australian history writing. The author convincingly shows that these are not only important in a female literary tradition but also significant in making 'Britain and the English-speaking world' aware of Australia and familiar with its 'landscape and the growing white society' in which 'the Indigenous population were destined to fade from view' (p.22).

The Zealous Conservator, A Life of **Charles Lane Poole**

John Dargavel, University of Western Australia Press, Perth, 2008, pp.xiii + 252

Lane Poole was a forester trained in France at the start of the 20th century who spent his life as a public servant and forest educator in South Africa, Sierra Leone, Western Australia, Papua New Guinea, and finally as federal Inspector-General of Forests in Canberra where he established the Australian Forestry School. Lane Poole made many enemies especially among the state conservators and his well-placed dedication to conserving and managing forests has been easily thwarted by governments and the timber industry. He died in 1970.



Saints, Sinners and **Goalposts, A History** of All Saints East St Kilda

Colin Holden, Australian Scholarly Publishing, Melbourne, 2008, pp. xiv + 313



An elegantly produced book based on impeccable research that links this old and surviving Anglican parish to Melbourne's suburban growth, tides of change in Anglicanism, and broader cultural movements. In the process, there is much of interest about 19th century Melbourne elites, the rise and fall of All Saints Grammar, the continuing interest in choral and organ music, the attributes of various incumbents, and much more. A substantial addition to the number of recent Melbourne Anglican parish histories, and a model to which other parish historians might aspire.

Divine Discontent, The Brotherhood of St Laurence: A History

Colin Holden & Richard Trembath with Judith Brett, Australian Scholarly Publishing, Melbourne, 2008, pp. ix + 351

An excellent analysis of the role of the Brotherhood in social welfare issues since its founding in Newcastle during the Great Depression. Its employment of professional staff from 1947, its adoption of a very secular face while maintaining its Anglican origins and connections, its tireless advocacy for action for groups not covered by existing government agencies, and its succession of activist directors following Tucker, have made it a large and important organization in Melbourne and Australian welfare delivery and policy. A very substantial history.

What's In A Name, The Lanes of East Melbourne



Deirdre Basham, Nina Crone, East Melbourne Historical Society, 122 George Street, East Melbourne, 3002, 2008, pp. 39

The naming of the lanes started about 30 years ago. This fine booklet supplies details about those after whom the lanes were named and is illustrated with contemporary and historical photos. Unusually, it has both index and lists of sources, as well as map. An excellent model for historical societies to follow in this often attempted publication.
