
Amongst other things, Victorians can:

Kate Prinsley awarded Churchill Fellowship

With the support of a Churchill Fellowship, Kate Prinsley, Executive Officer of RHSV, will visit peak bodies and specialised organisations in the United States and England to research programs in local history. She will be looking at innovative local history programs that demonstrate a growth in volunteer involvement, and at the sustainability of local history within communities. She will also be looking at examples, and the application of digital history to interpret events.

Her research project will take her to rural and city environments exploring programs that would be of benefit to Australia.

Kate will undertake her research project and report in June/July next year and looks forward to creating international links for the RHSV, and reinforcing the networks established by Joan Hunt when she undertook her fellowship.

RHSV receives Arts grant

The RHSV has received a grant from the City of Melbourne 2010 Arts Grant Program to develop a play about Jessie Webb.

It is particularly exciting to receive this grant in our centenary year as Jessie Webb was a founding member. She is also a significant figure in the city's history and is most notable as the acting professor of history at the University of Melbourne from 1925 - 1944. The History Department library bears her name. The grant gives the RHSV an innovative way to interpret history and bring to an audience the history of one of Melbourne's leading women.



OBITUARY:

The Honourable John **Harber Phillips AC QC**

When John Phillips was approached to be chairman of an RHSV Committee of Eminent Persons his response was immediate. He would be honoured and delighted, he said, to help the Committee devise a programme to celebrate the RHSV Centenary celebrations.

This was the unfailing response of The Honourable John Phillips AC QC to requests to assist community endeavours. At the time he was Provost of the Sir Zelman Cowen Centre of Victoria University. This appointment followed his distinguished legal career as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Victoria, a Judge of both the Supreme Court of Victoria and the Federal Court. His early career as a renowned criminal barrister led to his selection as the first Victorian Director of Public Prosecutions.

The study of history was one of his many interests. His book, The Trial of Ned Kelly (1987), remains a classic study in this widely ploughed field.

We were most grateful for his assistance in devising the successful celebration of our Centenary year. We join with the many persons in the Australian community who mourn his death.

Still needed, 100 years on


When the RHSV began its existence as the Historical Society of Victoria the paddock was almost empty. No one taught Australian history courses at schools or universities, there was no National Trust or Public Record Office, no Heritage Council or Museums Australia (Victoria), no History Council, Professional Historians' Association, Genealogical Society of Victoria or Port Phillip Pioneers, no Koorie Heritage Trust, no La Trobe Society, no specialist Australiana or Victorian historical collection in the state's Public Library, and hardly anything in the way of local historical societies in Victoria.

In direct or sometimes in very indirect ways the RHSV has played a role in building and nurturing these and other specialised bodies and collections. This has been through sustained work in raising the public's awareness of the importance of Victoria's history and the fragility of our heritage under the pressure of change and progress and the relentless march of time. Some institutions have grown to become strong and well-funded, and all are dynamic, for which we are grateful, but the need continues for a vigorous, independent historical society in Victoria.

The RHSV and its huge network of slightly over 300 affiliated historical societies remains the place where expert knowledge and local passion for Victoria's history resides. Your support as members, affiliate members, as donors and makers of bequests, as volunteers at A'Beckett Street and in your own local societies, and now as supporters of the new RHSV Foundation is essential. There is work to be done and we still have ambitious plans. Thank you for renewing that support as we enter our 101st year.

RHSV benefits from Deakin **Internships**

Over the past ten years, there have been several Deakin history students who have taken an internship at the RHSV as part of their undergraduate history majors. The internship is designed to give students a valuable experience in a community history setting where they can make use of their existing skills, extend these skills, and gain practical experience in working outside the normal university teaching environment. The RHSV is in many ways an ideal placement for students: it has wonderful, often untapped, resources; it has superb and knowledgeable volunteers who can guide the novice historian; it is a friendly workplace. The RHSV materially benefits from the students' work as can be seen in the accounts below. Deakin University is also the beneficiary of the RHSV's participation.

Don Gibb has been the Deakin staff person responsible for these internships and he acknowledges the wonderful mentoring work that has been done by Richard Barnden, Kate Prinsley and Nonie Long.

The very first internship student was Sue Blackwood who completed a project on some photo albums of the Royal Geographical Society of Australasia, Victorian branch under Richard's guidance. As those who heard Sue at the Centenary conference might realize, this was the beginning of very substantial further work that culminated in her 2006 Deakin PhD - 'Jungle, Desert, Ice: Royal Geographical Society of Australasia, Victorian Branch'.

Anna Di Giantosomasso in 2003 worked on the Lillian Cresswell collection of postcards featuring theatrical identities in the period, 1890-1920 and prepared a guide to these.

Leah Kemp in 2007 worked on the RHSV Council and General Meeting Minutes for the period, 1918-1929 and produced a table of their contents.

Recently, Tessa Keane examined the Manuscript Collection and assessed its value for the study of indigenous Australian and settler relations in the Port Phillip District before 1850 and produced a probing discussion of how it might be used by researchers.

Currently, Michelle Santoso is exploring the Studley Miller collection and Khylie Bray the Alexander Cameron Macdonald collection.

Typists who work at home have always supported computer-indexing at the RHSV. From time to time we need to call for new volunteers to join their ranks.


The basic monthly commitment is to type approximately 25 pages of handwritten or printed text into a table using MSWorks or MS Word. Typists receive photocopies of the text and return the completed table by e-mail or on disk (no printing is required). Work commitments are adjusted to take account of the volunteer's holidays, family commitments, home renovations and the like. When the typing is received it is printed and passed to the indexer for checking. It is then imported into the appropriate databases, so making additional information about our holdings more readily available to researchers.

Goldfields Mechanics' Institutes Tour Notes

Pam Baragwanath, Don Barjer, Bron Lowden (compilers), Mechanics' Institutes of Victoria Inc., Box 1080, Mitcham North, 3132, 2006, 61pp. A neat informative and illustrated guide to nearly

Australian Scholarly Publishing, Melbourne, extended, revised edition 2009 xiv + 345pp. (1st published, Jacaranda, 1965)




In 1965, this book was one of very few published

local and regional histories commissioned by a council and written by a professional historian. (Weston Bate's Brighton and Geoff Blainey's Camberwell were others.) Originally published at the time of the centenary of the town of Echuca and its proclamation as a city, the new handsomely produced edition demonstrates not only the substance of the first, but also the full flowering of its distinguished writer as well as continuing research in Echuca's and Victoria's history in the last 34 years. Echuca is now the municipal centre of the Shire of Campaspe. The original eight chapters look deceptively like the first eight in this edition but there have been extensive additions and careful modifications in these chapters as well as three new ones that help make this another considerable contribution to Victorian and regional history.

Disaster in the Dandenongs, The Kyeema Airliner Tragedy

Macarthur Job, Sierra Publishing & Mount Dandenong Historical Society, 2008, 64pp. Seventy years ago, a




DC2 airliner en route from Adelaide to Melbourne plunged into Mt Dandenong with its 18 crew and passengers killed. These included Charles Hawker, federal member for Wakefield; Thomas Hardy, Hugo Gramp and Sidney Hill-Smith, leading South Australia vignerons; and a number of lawyers and accountants returning from the royal commission on national health insurance in Perth. The

worst Australian aviation disaster at that time, it sparked decisions to set up air traffic control systems and the Department of Civil Aviation. This book outlines and explains how the tragedy occurred; provides the context of commercial airline development, planes and safety; and gives an account of the relocation of the crash site and subsequent commemorations.

Water for Gold, The Fight to Quench Central Victoria's Goldfields

Geoffrey Russell,

Australian Scholarly Publishing, Melbourne, 2009, xiii + 288 pp.



The 'great drought' of 1866 provided the spur for the construction of the Coliban System of Waterworks, completed in 1877, seen by the author as 'colonial Australia's most ambitious, sophisticated and controversial water project'. Designed by Joseph Brady, it was an 'engineering marvel'. The scheme raised debates about control, ownership and responsibility for payment of the huge costs of construction that resonate with current debates about private/public partnerships. The book shows the enormous importance of water supply to the goldfields of Bendigo and Castlemaine and adds much to local and regional history. This is a very substantial work, very clearly documented, wellindexed, and thoroughly researched.

A Study in Black and White, The Aborigines in Australian History

Malcolm Prentis, Rosenberg, Sydney, 2009, 192pp (3rd revised edition)
The author wrote one of the early 'document' books on the interaction of Indigenous and European Australians, published in 1975. The latest edition reflects both the vast body of work since published as well as the author's continued commitment to teaching

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and presenting material for students.

ASTUDY IN BLACK & WHITE The Abordance in Australian History Students.

The Suffragist and the Squatter, Annie Lister and P. S. Watson

Norman C. Hutchinson,

N. C. Hutchinson, 1/2 Linden St, Box Hill Sth, 3128, 117pp. The author charts the lives of Annie Lister, early suffragist and daughter of a wealthy Melbourne merchant, and Sidney Watson, squatter's son, who were married in 1898. After two adventurous years in the Klondike gold rush, they returned to Victoria where Annie was prominent in the suffrage movement, the establishment of free kindergartens and in organizations concerned with the protection of children. They both became very active Christian Scientists as were many in the suffragist movement. Theirs is an intriguing story that invites more study.

The Mill Mystery, A History of the Valley Worsted Mills Ltd, Geelong

Judith Rice, Histec Publications, Melbourne, 2008, ix + 62 pp.
The mill operated from 1924 to 1973 and was one of the mills added in the 1920s to those that had operated from the late 19th century and that




had made Geelong a considerable centre for the manufacture of woollen textiles. Written by the daughter of the last general manager, illustrated with excellent photos and plans, and clear in its descriptions of technical processes, this is a worthwhile addition to Geelong's and Victoria's industrial history.

Associated Public Schools of Victoria Celebrating One Hundred Years, 1908-2008

Gillian Hibbins (comp.), Associated Public Schools of Victoria, Melbourne, 2008, 48pp.

The APS was formed in 1908 with six schools; five more were added in 1958. Reflecting its title, this publication celebrates the existence of the associa-



tion, but only in sport. There are some compelling historical vignettes written by the compiler and lots of glossy, mostly recent photos, with short pieces on each of the schools and the advent of girls in the APS.

On The Home Front, Melbourne in Wartime, 1939-1945 Kate Darian-Smith,

Melbourne University Press, Melbourne, 2nd edition 2009, xiii + 303pp. (1st published Oxford University Press 1990)

Despite the continuing interest in and burgeoning of publishing about Australia and war, there have not been many writers who



have followed up Darian-Smith's encompassing study of Melbourne in works on other places and regions. This is a most welcome republication; but the decision to omit the splendid photos (largely from the AWM collection) is surely regrettable. The author acknowledges receiving new information from those with 'first-hand knowledge' of the war (p. vii). Was there no pedant who noticed what must be an error of transcription (now on p. 39) that people queued for a 2/- box of Newmans chocolates that weighed 4 lbs (not presumably 1/4 lb.)? That aside, there is a very succinct appraisal of recent writing about the war and its commemoration in the last 20 years. A very worthy return to print.

Another grand historical landmark bites the dust

Robin Grow argues that our current Government is supporting commercial interests before our heritage.

he heart of Melbourne was transformed during the 1930s as a rich association of commercial interests, the latest styling, new building techniques and materials and colourful facades resulted in a new world of Art Deco department stores, centred on Bourke Street. A number of other buildings emerged in nearby streets to serve the retail precinct.

In 1935, Lonsdale House (at 269-73 Lonsdale Street) was created by re-modelling two 19th Century buildings, abutting onto Caledonian Lane. The designer was the prolific and highly-regarded architect I G Anderson, responsible for many buildings in Geelong in the 1920s and in Tasmania after WW II. Whilst his work in Melbourne in the 1930s included designs for apartment blocks, markets, factories, cinemas, houses and maisonettes, municipal buildings, cafes and golf club houses, Lonsdale House is his only known commission in the city centre.

The building, finished in cement render, skilfully integrates the two sections - the western section features a distinctive banded upper façade treatment, large steel-framed window bays to enable maximum light to enter, and the name of Lonsdale House spelt out in stylised lettering. The narrower eastern end features shorter sections and two curved balconies, but is dominated by the stepped tower at the parapet line. Towers were commonly used in this era to give prominence to buildings by projecting above the prescribed building height limit but none compare with this piece of Art Deco fantasy, consisting of semi-circles, squares, and scalloped vertical sections painted in a contrasting colour - all beneath the almost mandatory 1930s flagpole. Shops at street level were finished in black tiles and shiny metal shop surrounds. Tenants on upper floors included small factories and businesses associated with



the clothing industry, such as tailors, mantle and corset makers, pressers, furriers, manufacturer's agents, and a mannequin academy, whilst the Myer advertising department occupied the fourth floor for many years.

In 1984, the importance of Lonsdale House was recognized and it was included in the Central Activities
District Conservation Study by Graeme Butler and then in the Melbourne
Planning Scheme as part of the Post
Office Precinct Heritage Overlay (Post
Office Precinct). It has a grading of B with a streetscape level 2. Whilst this grading should have provided protection against demolition, this was not to be the case. It was nominated to the Victorian Heritage Register in 2008, but was not accepted as of State significance by the officers of Heritage Victoria.

The owners of the building, Myer, and their bankers, Colonial First Sate, fought very hard against listing the building on the State Register because it was earmarked for demolition as part of the redevelopment of the Myer Lonsdale Street store. Adaptive re-use of the building was never seriously considered, as the plans called for abutting Caledonian Lane to be doubled

in size. The building was in the way of two-way truck traffic! Like many other developments throughout Victoria, the project was 'called in' by the Planning Minister, who approved its removal from the Melbourne Planning Scheme and its demolition. The City of Melbourne was asked for comment and raised no objection to the demolition of a significant building.

What does this mean for Melbourne? The loss of any historic building reduces our capacity to understand the past. None of us want to live in a museum but we do want to see historic buildings adapted to serve a new purpose. These buildings also contribute to cultural tourism and provide residents and visitors with the opportunity to appreciate architecture from previous eras. There has been a major outcry about the building from residents of Melbourne and from around the world, who are incredulous at the decision. Why couldn't it have been adapted to meet both commercial and historic needs? Who was supposed to protect it? Good questions – what the decision demonstrates is that commercial interests are paramount in Victoria at present and they are able to convince Ministers that it is worth trading off a wonderfully stylish historic building for a wider lane and yet another glass box that will be totally out of place in an historic streetscape.

You need only download to print those sections of the manual which are specifically required, and the whole document can be kept as a digital image on a disk for easy reference. It is compact, easy to read, accessible, and immensely helpful.

The essential subjects relating to collection policies, recording the items either manually or digitally, itemised use of the worksheets, and applicable examples, all combine to make this the "bible" for community historical collections.
